JURIES

Date and time:

- Piano juries are held between 8:30am-1pm on the Saturday after classes end.
- Students are assigned a specific time by the piano faculty. Preferences considered.

Grading and Comments:

- The jury counts for 50% of a student's semester grade.
- The remaining 50% includes attendance, performance requirements, listening requirements, concert attendance, etc., according to individual studio policies.
- Failure to play a jury results in a "F" for the semester
- Written evaluations will be available from your instructor following juries

Other Information:

- Students play for the applied piano faculty only, not an audience or other students.
- All juries are held in Hinton Music Hall.
- Music from a previous jury may not be repeated.

Memory Requirements:

• Approximately 75% of any jury must be performed from memory unless stated otherwise by the instructor. MM Collaborative majors may use music for all works.

Upper-Division Jury (Undergraduate)

- Must be passed in order to enroll in upper-division applied lessons.
- Required for piano majors, Instrumental Add-ons, Jazz Studies majors, BAs pursuing a recital capstone, some Pedagogy Certificate candidates, and Music Minors*
- Played at the end of the 4th semester of study.
- If not passed, lower-division private instruction must continue until the jury is passed.
- Students may attempt the Upper-Division Jury a maximum of three (3) times.

Long Jury (Graduate)

- Required only for MM Piano Performance majors.
- Played at the end of the second semester of study.
- Must be passed in order to continue in the MM Piano Performance degree.

RECITALS

- Recital scheduling opens to students in April for the following academic year.
- Once a date has been determined, students should complete the "Hinton Recital Approval Form" found on the "Student Utilities" page of the School of Music website.
- Students are excused from a jury during the semester in which a recital is given.
- Sophomore recitals are optional, pending instructor approval and hall availability.
- Approximately 75% of any recital must be performed from memory unless stated otherwise by the instructor. MM Collaborative majors may use music for all works.

	 Half-recital: Approximately 30 minutes of music. Repertoire should demonstrate a range of styles and abilities. Up to 25% of the program may be collaborative, at instructor's discretion.
Performance	Senior Recital
	 Full-length recital: Approximately 50 minutes of piano music. Repertoire should demonstrate a range of styles and abilities. Up to 25% of the program may be collaborative, at instructor's discretion.

RECITAL HEARINGS

- Required for all student recitals.
- Must be scheduled at least 2 weeks prior to the recital.
- Two or more members of the piano faculty must be present.
- The entire recital must be presented as it will be performed.
- If the hearing is not passed, another hearing must be performed or the recital rescheduled.

OTHER

PRIVATE TEACHING POLICY

Students are not permitted to use MTSU School of Music facilities - including practice rooms, classrooms, or studios - for the purpose of private teaching. This is a liability to the University and occupies space that is needed for students and staff to practice. The only exception is for students registered for Piano Pedagogy or who are teaching through any other School of Music sponsored program. Any questions regarding facility use should be directed to the School of Music Facilities Manager.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIP INFORMATION

- Graduate Assistantships may be awarded in the areas of accompanying, class piano, and applied instruction, depending on availability and area need.
- Graduate students with specializations in Piano Performance and Collaborative Piano are eligible for Piano Area Graduate Assistantships.
- Graduate Assistantship loads in piano are determined by the piano faculty, in consultation with ensemble directors, applied vocal or instrumental faculty, the Coordinator of Class Piano, and the Director of the School of Music, as appropriate.
- Load:
 - o A full assistantship is considered 20 hours of work per week.
 - A half assistantship is considered 10 hour of work per week.
- Duties
 - o Specific duties vary each semester depending on School of Music needs.
 - Specific assignments will be made by the applied piano faculty at the beginning of each semester.
- For both teaching and performance assistantships, class prep and/or practice time accounts for a portion of the hourly requirements above.
